This is our moment to change cancer's trajectory, to save and improve millions of lives, creating a new future for Canadians and a healthier world for all. Join us.

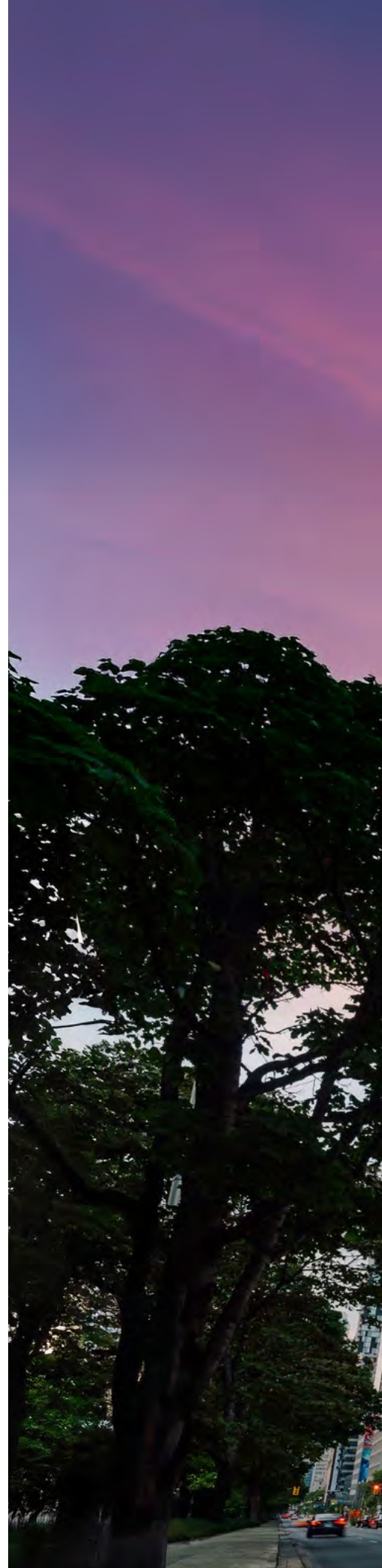


About Princess Margaret Cancer Centre

- Focused exclusively on cancer, **with over 21,000 new patients seen every year**, treating over 200 cancer types, and making The Princess Margaret one of the largest cancer treatment centres in Canada. Our doctors treat more rare cancers in a day than most physicians see in a lifetime.

For almost 75 years, our relentless pursuit of excellence and innovation has led to several world-first, groundbreaking advances in cancer research, diagnostics, and treatment, helping patients with cancer everywhere.

- Drs. Ernest McCulloch and James Till discovered stem cells, the basis for bone marrow transplants
- Dr. Vera Peters demonstrated that early-stage Hodgkin lymphoma, a cancer previously thought incurable, could be cured if treated with high dose radiation therapy
- The cloning of the human T-cell receptor, the basis for immunotherapy, which is now the standard of care, and a cure, for dozens of cancers
- The discovery that a lumpectomy, combined with radiation therapy, was as effective as radical mastectomies in curing early-stage breast cancer
- The discovery of the link between breast density and breast cancer, revolutionizing mammography techniques and breast cancer screening guidelines globally
- The first chemotherapy for hormone-resistant prostate cancer

The Allan Slaight Scientists at The Princess Margaret embody the bold spirit of creativity, collaboration and visionary thinking that defined the late Allan Slaight's life and legacy. As some of the brightest minds in cancer research, they are pursuing discoveries that are transforming our understanding of cancer and helping shape the future of treatment and care.

These 25 exceptional scientists are uncovering the fundamental biology of cancer, using new technology and tools to generate insights that lead to entirely new approaches for prevention, diagnosis and treatment. Their work includes revealing how cancer cells communicate, identifying the rare cells that drive tumour growth, and advancing our understanding of how cancers develop, evolve and respond to therapy.

The significance of these discoveries extends far beyond the laboratory. For years, the promise of personalized cancer vaccines remained just that: a promise. Today's breakthroughs are rooted in decades of scientific discovery, providing the promise of new treatments for cancer patients, including recent advances in melanoma. These discoveries demonstrate how bold investments in fundamental science at Princess Margaret Cancer Centre can ultimately change the course of patient care globally.

This progress is made possible through the transformational \$50 million gift from The Slaight Family Foundation and La Fondation Emmanuelle Gattuso. Their historic philanthropy ignited the Carry The Fire campaign and continues to fuel scientific excellence and discovery across Princess Margaret Cancer Centre.

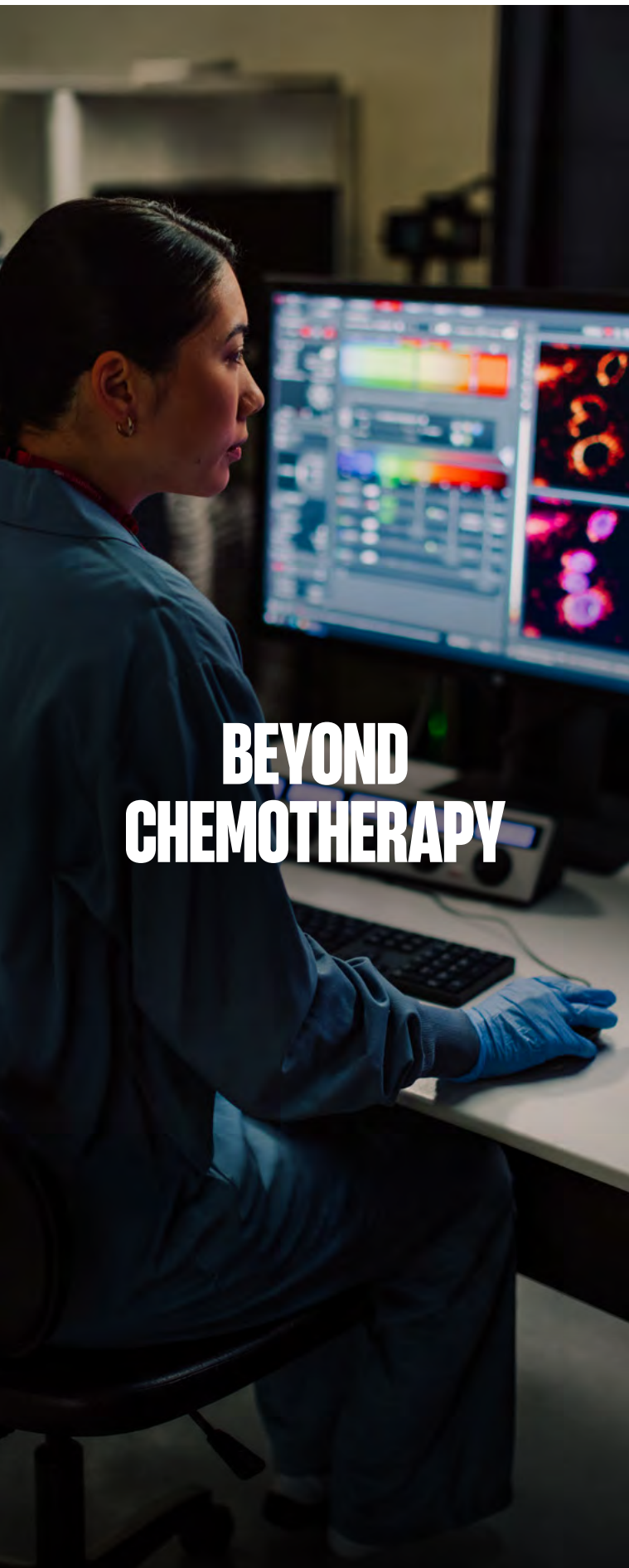

Our campaign will ignite a revolution in how the world understands, prevents, diagnoses, and treats cancer. Because when we all Carry The Fire, The Princess Margaret will lead the world in transforming cancer research and treatment, benefiting patients across Canada and globally.

Carry The Fire is focused on priorities across three strategic areas where bold investment will drive lasting impact, redefining cancer survival rates and the cancer experience for patients and their loved ones: Stage 0, Beyond Chemotherapy, and Boundless Cancer Care.

Stopping Cancer in Its Tracks



Preventing, Intercepting, and Detecting Cancer at Its Earliest Stages

Cancer remains Canada's leading cause of death, and more than half of all cancers are diagnosed late, when treatments are less effective and the toll on patients and families is greatest.

However, there is hope through early detection. In fact, early detection remains the most promising approach to helping more patients survive cancer, with the chances of survival increased dramatically for almost all cancer types if the disease can be detected at an early stage.

At Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, we believe that cancer can be caught even earlier than Stage 1, at what we're calling "Stage 0." Using personalized biomarkers and molecular-level detection techniques, we know we can identify cancer and intercept it before it even starts to take hold.

We are determined to prevent more cancers from occurring in the first place by investing more in research on cancer risk factors, especially for the growing number of cancer cases in younger people around the world.

Signature Initiatives:

- **The Peter Gilgan Centre for Early Cancer Detection Research** is the largest research program of its kind globally and will focus on three major areas:
 - Understanding how cancer begins by uncovering the earliest biological signs of the disease
 - Developing cutting-edge technologies to detect cancer sooner and measure risk in newly diagnosed or high-risk individuals
 - Translating discoveries into clinical practice, including building the world's most ambitious Molecular Residual Disease (MRD) program to spot the earliest signs of cancer returning after treatment
- **OurGenes (Helix) Program**
OurGenes will screen up to 100,000 people in Ontario over the next five years for genetic conditions that increase their risk of hereditary cancers and a condition tied to high cholesterol and heart disease. This is one of the largest population genomics studies in Canada, while also combining screening results to allow study participants and their healthcare teams to make decisions to potentially delay, reduce or prevent cancer and heart disease.
- **Cancer Prevention & Interception**
Programs to prevent cancer before it forms, especially in high-risk populations
- **High-Risk Pathways, Screening & National Precision Testing Hub**
Precision tools, Molecular Residual Disease testing, and national-scale diagnostics
- **The Origins of Cancer**
Reconstructing how cancer forms, and then "editing out" the defects, to learn how to reverse engineer the disease in its earliest stages

Finding Cancers at Stage 0: Changing Lives Through Early Detection and Interception

Though born ten years apart, siblings Juliet and Lucas Locke share a strong bond, made even stronger through their mutual diagnosis of Li-Fraumeni Syndrome (LFS). LFS is a rare condition caused by an inherited gene mutation and comes with an almost 100% risk of developing cancer. Juliet was just 14 when she was diagnosed with leukemia. Their mother, Luana Locke, also has LFS and has lived through six different cancer diagnoses.

Previously, catching early signs of cancer could involve long wait times for results which were often imprecise.

But now, researchers at The Princess Margaret have pioneered a groundbreaking new way to detect cancer earlier in people like Juliet and Lucas – often even before a tumour becomes visible, or symptoms appear. Through an early detection technique known as a “liquid biopsy,” microscopic traces of cancer can be detected in a patient's blood before it's visible on an X-ray or CT scan.

This allows doctors to catch cancer much earlier before it begins to develop. By interrupting the tumour's growth at the molecular level, we can intercept cancer at its most treatable stage when patients have the best chance of survival.

This technique could also eventually eliminate the need for frequent scans and tests – which are time-consuming and stressful for patients – and increase the specificity and accuracy of cancer diagnoses.

“It's incredible how much they can tell through one blood test,” says Juliet. “We're so fortunate that this technology exists and that we get to benefit from it.”

“We're beyond grateful for the team at The Princess Margaret,” adds Lucas. “Regular scans and check-ups are routine when you have LFS, but the ability to predict when and where cancers develop rather than react when one has already developed would be life-changing.”

Thanks to these advancements in early detection, Juliet looks forward to being able to spend as much time as possible with her brother. “My mom lost her brother to cancer, and we see how much that affects her. Hopefully, Lucas and I don't have to endure that same fate because of the work that's being done at The Princess Margaret.”

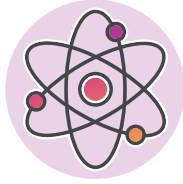

BEYOND CHEMOTHERAPY

Changing the Way the World Treats Cancer



Delivering the Right Therapy, at the Right Time, With Fewer Side Effects

The landscape of cancer treatment has undergone a significant transformation in recent years, driven by rapid advancements in technology and a deeper understanding of the molecular underpinnings of the disease. Traditional therapies, such as chemotherapy and radiation, are effective but often result in substantial side effects. At Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, research continues in the clinic and in the lab to enable targeted and less-toxic treatments that harness the power of precision medicine, immunotherapy, and advanced computational tools.

Innovative New Treatments Include:

- Breakthrough targeted therapies for acute myeloid leukemia (AML) and pancreatic cancer
- Personalized cancer vaccines designed specifically to train a patient's immune system to fight their individual form of cancer and keep it from coming back after treatment
- New ways of delivering radiation therapy, and blood tests called liquid biopsies that evaluate fragments of tumours circulating in the bloodstream called circulating tumour DNA (ctDNA). These liquid biopsies are being tested as non-invasive ways to detect cancer relapses early and aid in personalization of treatment

Signature Initiatives:

- **Silber Family Theranostics Centre**
Theranostics, a groundbreaking nuclear medicine approach, combines sophisticated imaging with a targeted treatment in one, to diagnose and treat a variety of cancers at the molecular level
- **A Plan for Canada's First Particle Therapy Centre**
Particle therapy ensures patients can receive the world's most advanced radiation treatment, which targets tumours with extraordinary precision while minimizing damage to healthy tissue
- **Intelligent Surgical Intervention**
Integrated AI, robotics, and image-guided technologies help surgeons visualize, navigate, and remove cancer with unprecedented accuracy, sparing healthy tissue and reducing complications
- **Princess Margaret Therapeutics**
Through our Discoveries-to-Clinic program, we accelerate made-at-The Princess Margaret therapies into first-in-human trials to deliver our homegrown discoveries directly to patients

When Hope Was Slim, a Clinical Trial Gave Gary More Treatment Options

Gary Wang was 27 when he was diagnosed with Stage 4 stomach cancer in August 2020. He had just graduated with a master's degree in computer science and landed his dream job as a data scientist. He and his wife, Catherine, were making plans to start a family.

For months, Gary had been experiencing stomach pain, acid reflux, and fatigue – but by the time his cancer was detected, the disease had already spread. Doctors told him he had between one month and one year to live. Not long ago, his story would have ended there.

Stomach cancer has one of the lowest survival rates. And once it metastasizes, it's usually too late. But Gary was referred to Dr. Elena Elimova at Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, where she discovered that his cancer carried a distinct molecular profile. Gary gained access to an international HER2-targeted clinical trial and received therapies that matched his cancer's unique biology.

These treatments cleared cancer not only from the primary tumour, but from his entire body. Through a clinical trial, his tumour's genetic makeup was also sequenced for ongoing research, bringing The Princess Margaret closer to decoding and defeating these cancers for future patients.

Gary completed his treatment just in time to welcome his first child and today remains cancer-free. His outcome is still rare, but it offers a glimpse into the power of the innovative treatments that are enabled by donor-funded research.

The Princess Margaret's innovative research, made possible through philanthropy, is helping to create a future where cancer treatments are tailored to each patient's biology, even in cases where the cancer is at an advanced stage.

Redefining the Cancer Experience



Providing Holistic Mental Health, Caregiver, and Survivorship Support

Thanks to treatment advances, there are more cancer survivors than ever before. In Canada, more than 1.5 million patients are currently living with, or beyond, a cancer diagnosis. With more patients living after a cancer diagnosis, and living longer than in the past, it is vitally important that we not only celebrate cancer survivorship but also care for the specific needs of cancer survivors. Many need cancer rehabilitation and mental health support services in order to continue to work, care for themselves, and live full and capable lives, but these services are not available in many places and are not a standard part of many cancer care programs.

Signature Initiatives:

- **Cancer Mental Health**
A global model for cancer-specific mental healthcare, supporting patients from diagnosis through survivorship, because one-third of cancer patients experience depression or anxiety and 78% of survivors face unmet emotional needs after treatment
- **Cancer Connectome**
Understanding how cancer interacts with the body's most vital systems, such as the brain and mental health, so we can predict complications earlier, personalize treatment, and improve outcomes for patients
- **Cancer Rehabilitation & Survivorship**
Helping survivors regain their strength, independence, and quality of life
- **Care Without Walls**
A remote-care model enabling patients to receive expert support from the comfort of their own homes
- **Transformational Cancer Experience Fund**
Elevating the comfort and dignity of our patients across the cancer journey
- **Princess Margaret Lodge**
Affordable accommodations and a supportive community for out-of-town patients and their loved ones
- **Magic Castle Childcare**
A free, supervised space for children whose parents or guardians are receiving cancer care

Mental Health Support Helped Michael and Amalia Navigate the Challenges of a Cancer Diagnosis

Michael was young, athletic, and had just returned from playing professional soccer overseas when debilitating back pain sent him to the hospital. After a series of scans, tests, and bloodwork, he received a shocking diagnosis: acute lymphoblastic leukemia.

He was immediately transferred to Princess Margaret Cancer Centre for 30 days of induction chemotherapy. Suddenly, his partner, Amalia, was thrust into the role of his full-time caregiver. "Those first few weeks were full of sadness, fear, and panic," she recalls.

Amalia coordinated appointments, tracked medications, managed test results, and often led conversations with doctors when Michael couldn't. While she was able to lean on her loved ones for help, Amalia felt like she needed more support from people that would understand the stress and anxiety that she was going through.

Alongside the cancer treatments that Micheal was receiving, both he and Amalia, who were in their early 20s, took advantage of the Adolescent and Young Adult (AYA) Program through the Department of Supportive Care at The Princess Margaret.

The AYA Program provides personalized support for the specific challenges facing adolescents and young people with cancer. Young people diagnosed with cancer – typically defined as adolescents and young adults aged 15 to 39 – face unique physical, emotional, and life-stage challenges that differ greatly from older adults or young children.

These can include fertility risks, education and career disruptions, social isolation, challenges with body image and relationships, loss of autonomy, and concern about the long-term side effects of their cancer treatment.

"For me, being able to access the AYA program in the same place that Michael was receiving treatment helped me get through this extremely challenging time while staying present for him."

Chemotherapy attacked Michael's cancer cells, but it was the immunotherapy, and later a stem-cell transplant, that enabled him to eventually be declared cancer-free. Ten days after finishing his immunotherapy, Michael proposed to Amalia. She happily said yes and today they are thrilled to be planning their wedding.

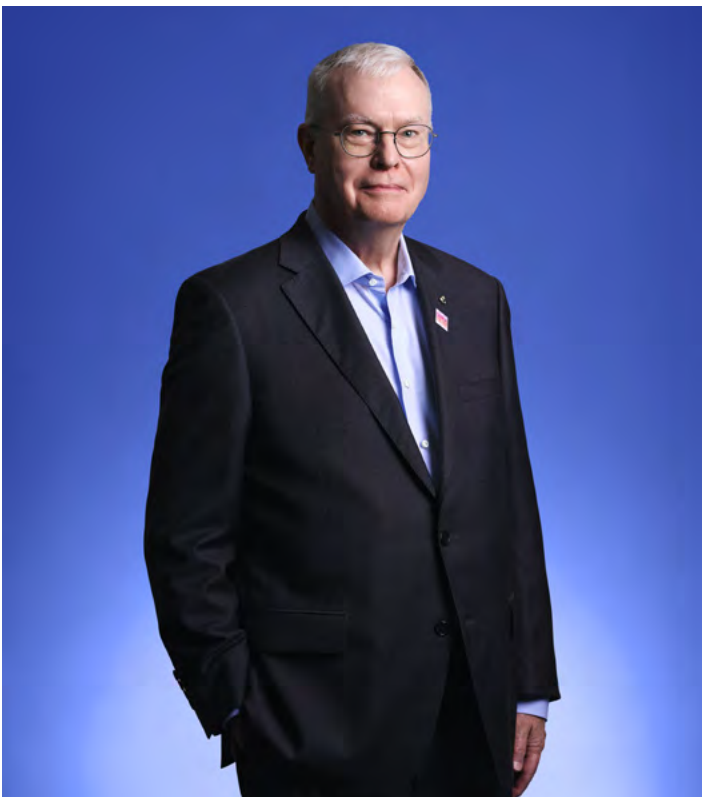

In 2007, when Steve Cohen heard about the very first Princess Margaret Cancer Foundation Ride, he had seven friends and family members who had all been diagnosed with cancer. "I felt like I needed to do something for them," Steve recalls. That motivated him to not only join the Ride but create his own team, Steve's Cycle Paths.

"Raising funds for cancer research, treatment, and care is why we do this. But we've also built a community." In 2016, 257 riders wore the Steve's Cycle Paths jersey in 2026, and the team has cumulatively raised an incredible \$16.2 million for The Princess Margaret, a true testament to the impact of ongoing support.
